


It's February. The month or Punxsutawney Phil. The month of Presidential birthdays. The month that celebrates Love. How did a holiday to love and romance find its way into our calendar in February?





Actually, the connection is not at all clear. Valentine was martyred the day before the pagan festival to the goddess Februata Juno at which boys drew girls' names for acts of sexual promiscuity. Were legends about the martyr's death modified to replace the heathen custom? No one knows for sure. In fact, there may have been two or even three martyrs named Valentine who died in different parts of the empire at about the same time. We know little or nothing about any of them.

Take the Roman Valentine as an example. A city gate on the Flaminian Way and a chapel near it were named for him. Several ancient Christian writers mention his name. There is no doubt he lived and was tortured before being beaten with clubs and beheaded. And yet we have no sure account of why.



Some say this Valentine was a young man with a tender heart who aided Christians who were undergoing martyrdom. He was not even a Christian at the time. Arrested for his activities, he converted to faith while in prison and would not renounce it. Knowing he was going to die, he wrote letters to his friends saying "Remember your Valentine."

Another legend says that the Roman Valentine was a priest who defied the Emperor Claudius's temporary order and secretly married couples so the husbands wouldn't have to go to war. Claudius desperately needed more soldiers and did not appreciate this interference.

A third legend says the Roman Valentine was a priest who refused to sacrifice to pagan gods. Imprisoned for this, he gave testimony in prison and through his prayers the jailer's daughter was healed. On the day of his execution he left her a note signed "Your Valentine."

During the Middle ages it was popularly believed birds paired in mid-February. This also reaffirmed the association of romantic love with Valentine's name. Whatever the truth behind the legends, St. Valentine's day has become a day we connect with romance and friendship. As we continue to read through "The Story" together, and ponder its meaning in worship on Sundays, we keep discovering the truth of God's deep love for people. While God certainly punishes wrongdoing, God also does not give up on people, and continues to pursue us. The Bible, as God's story, is the greatest love story ever told.

Marlin is going to Rwanda, Africa! He received a confirming telephone call Tuesday morning, January 21, 2014, telling him the good news. Praise God and thank you for all the prayers. He will leave April 26, and return May 3. Accompanying him from the West Coast will be Becky Gross, Manager of the West Coast Region and Susan Elliott, Las Vegas, NV.

Preliminary information indicated that they will join other Operation Christmas Child Volunteers to distribute Shoeboxes to five different locations in Rwanda and possibility witness a graduation ceremony of children who have completed the Twelve Steps in The Greatest Journey schooling.



The "once in a lifetime" trip is a dream come true for Marlin, who has promoted the Operation Shoebox program at Harvest and in the community since 1999. He and Marilyn have helped sort and pack boxes at Collection Centers for 10 years and attended two of the Connect Conferences for year-round volunteers. They



have visited the main headquarters for Samaritan's Purse, the project's organization sponsor, in Boone, North Carolina and are members of the Manteca GO Team in the Stanislaus and San Joaquin County areas.

The first ever Connect Volunteer simulcast live on the Internet the day before Marlin's confirmation gave the official 2013 totals of shoeboxes collected. Totals included: 527,301 from the West Coast Region (California, Nevada and Hawaii); 7,541,468 from the United States; and 9,950,000 worldwide.



Social media statistics indicated a growing interest in the Operation Project, over 6.1 million hits on their website, as well as an increase in the number of bookstores (1,156) nationwide promoting the program. Some 2.1 million youth are registered participants, as are 8,302 year round volunteers. Extending God's Word and the Love of Jesus to children ages 2 to 14 around

the world through the distribution of shoeboxes has been a phenomenal success in its twenty years of operation through God's answer to prayers and dedicated volunteers.
